Mayor Buckshon presented Cora Castellani with a proclamation in honor of scoring her 1,000th point as a junior at Valley View. March 4, 2026 is Cora Castellani day in Jessup. Congratulations Cora

Consent Agenda: Approve the minutes of the regular meeting on February 4, 2026, and the special meeting on February 11, 2026.

Approve the Secretary's report, February payroll in the amount of \$65,848.02 and general fund payments in the amount of \$93,081.45

Reports: Mayor Buchshon noted the signs at the entrances to town are in disrepair and should be addressed. There is one missing on Hill Street and it should be reinstalled. In February Jessup celebrated its inaugural Groundhog Day. Hose Company #1 dedicated their hall to the late James Walsh.

Planning Commission Chairperson - Brittani Barscheski explained that she sends reports and letters when the Planning Commission is taking action. Sunnyside Road Associates, LLC land development plan is currently on hold pending an upcoming zoning hearing.

Zoning Hearing Board Chairperson – Jeff Smith noted he spoke with Mario regarding Kearney Steel and there has been no movement. There is a hearing on March 23, 2026, regarding Sunnyside Road Associates, LLC.

Controller Ben Cardoni gave an overview of the Borough accounts.

Zoning Officer Amos Valenti gave an overview of activity for the month of February.

Chief of Police Derek Fozard – The police department encountered an unusual amount of leave of officers for the month of February. Generally, there is an uptick in leave for June, July and August. This left the department somewhat short staffed which accounted for the decrease in proactive numbers he saw in comparison to January and February. Special thank you to DPW for putting together the new lockers for the department. There was a cost savings of \$300.00 per locker by taking on this task in house. The old lockers were donated to LaSalle Academy and they were very grateful. LaSalle asked for a police presence during mass which happens a few times per week. Jessup Police have been present for the past few months and LaSalle is very appreciative. The new reporting system is up and running. There will be a zoom call next week to work out the kinks.

DPW Foreman Joe Cirba – The Borough is in need of paving. The majority of Borough roads are full of alligator cracking. Storm drains in Winton are in need of replacement because the bottoms are rotted away.

Solicitor Maura Armezzani Tunis – She hasn't received any updates regarding the Borough truck. She asked if Council would like her to attend the upcoming meeting with PennDOT regarding the railroad bridge on Constitution Ave. She plans to attend the March 23rd zoning hearing unless Council directs otherwise.

Borough Manager Coleen Watt – Letter of intent was sent to DCED requesting a study of both Hose Companies. Met with Lackawanna County to look at installing handicap curb cuts near the VFW on Second Ave., the Sarah Bratty Park project will be going to bid in the coming weeks.

Council Comments: Tom Fiorelli discussed garbage receptacles for the parks. Jeff Castellani congratulated Cora Castellani on her proclamation. Ron Kordish asked about the Ferdinand, Flynn and Morgan Streets project. Robbie Martin commended Cora for her accomplishments and noted the award was well earned. He discussed the Borough finances, and he would like to implement a plan to address the Borough infrastructure. Jerry Crinella announced he attended a meeting with a prospective buyer for the bank. Curt Camoni congratulated Cora Castellani. He has concerns with the viaduct and traffic being cut off to the residents of Ferdinand, Flynn and Morgan Streets. He wants the Borough to look at a revitalization plan for the community. He would also like to see a financial plan put in place. Gregg Betti announced the tickets for the Jessup 150 dinner will go on sale next week. He looked at Dickson City's revitalization plan and thinks we should start our own committee.

Public Comment: Jeff Smith congratulated Ms. Castellani. He discussed Fell Townships' huge win in superior court. Shout out to DPW for fabricating a rack to hold the salt spreaders. He commended Council on the capital improvement projects they have completed and noted they have done a great job.

Brittani Barscheski noted the bridge is the railroad authority's responsibility. The next meeting is March 17th.

Catrina Bauer called State Representative Kyle Mullins, PennDOT and the Railroad Authority about the issues with trucks hitting the bridge on Constitution Ave. She recommends the Borough submit a complaint to PennDOT via the website. Her family was impacted by the most recent accident at the bridge for 7.5 hours. They were unable to go to and from their home because the road was blocked by a tractor trailer. Her children walk through neighboring yards to get the school bus because it's too dangerous to let them walk under the bridge to the market to get the bus.

Melissa Maus raised the same concerns she has been raising for the past three years. Speeding on Lawler Drive. Recently she found a two-year-old walking down the street without parents. She asked about installing speed humps or speed cushions. She is looking for a long term solution.
